Wales' new curriculum

Successful Futures

A new curriculum is being developed for **ALL** schools in Wales. This will be ready and used by schools from **2022**.

The whole approach to developing our pupils aged 3-16 will change.

What are the main changes?

The new curriculum will focus more on developing pupils' skills for life. This has always been a priority for us at Trinity Fields.

It will help pupils learn new skills and use these in a ever changing world.

Pupils will develop their digital skills through a new **Digital Competence Framework** (DCF).

This framework will help pupils learn about online learning and the risks that come with the online world.

A Parents' Guide to the DCF is also available.

The new curriculum will give schools more freedom to support pupils' learning so that we get the best possible outcomes for each pupil.

Assessment will also change. The focus will be on helping all pupils understand how they are doing and what they need to do next.

The 4 purposes of the curriculum

The curriculum will support our pupils to be:

Ambitious, capable learners, ready to learn throughout their lives.

Enterprising, creative contributors, ready to play a full part in life and work.

Ethical, informed citizens of Wales and the world.

Healthy, confident individuals, ready to lead fulfilling lives as valued members of society.

Areas of Learning and Experience (AoLE)

The new curriculum will have 6 AoLEs:



Art, drama, music, dance, digital media.



PE, sexuality and relationships education (SRE), substance misuse, healthy eating, food technology, work-related learning.



History, geography, RE, social studies.



Speaking (communication) and listening, reading and writing, Welsh, modern foreign language, digital communication.



Number, logic, measures, data, numeracy for life.



Design technology, computer science.
